## **Honeoye Falls Mayor Richard Milne Elected Second Vice President of the Conference of Mayors**

On May 6, at its 104th Annual Meeting, the membership of the New York State Conference of Mayors elected Richard Milne, Mayor of the Village of Honeoye Falls, to serve as NYCOM Second Vice President for the next year.

"At a time when local officials are working cooperatively and innovatively to do more with less, Mayor Milne's leadership will be instrumental in NYCOM's efforts to achieve the mandate relief necessary to allow for maximum efficiency at the local level," stated Peter A. Baynes, Executive Director of the Conference of Mayors. "Our membership will benefit greatly from his experience and vision." Also elected to serve as NYCOM officers are: President – Mayor Richard Donovan, Village of Minoa; First Vice President – Mayor Ann Thane, City of Amsterdam; and Treasurer – Mayor Gerald Jennings, City of Albany. The Conference of Mayors represents 582 cities and villages in New York State, ranging from the smallest village to the City of New York.

Richard Milne is currently serving his third term as Mayor for the Village of Honeoye Falls and is honored to have been elected to this position. He credits the support of his family, the professionalism and teamwork of the Village staff and Village Trustees and fellow Monroe County Mayors for their support and teamwork. All of which play an important role in his success as Mayor in Honeoye Falls and with NYCOM.

When Mayor Milne is elected President of NYCOM in May 2015 he will be the first village mayor from Monroe County to become NYCOM President, and will join former Rochester mayors Frank Lamb (1969-70), Peter Barry (1959-60) and Charles Stanton (1936-38) as mayors from Monroe County to have served as NYCOM President since NYCOM's formation in 1910.
